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1 IRVING: Good morning. Thank you for attending the  
2 Commissioner Legislative Session this morning, which  
3 is Wednesday, January 15th. First on the agenda is  
4 Approval of the Minutes of the January 8th meeting.  
5 ROUSSEAU: So moved.  
6 IRVING: Seconded. All in favor say "aye."  
7 ROUSSEAU: Aye.  
8 IRVING: Aye. Motion passed. Number two on the  
9 agenda, addition of the Allen County Code - Title 12-  
10 Article 78. Good morning, Mike--  
11 MR. MCALEXANDER: Good morning.  
12 IRVING: --how are you this morning?  
13 MR. MCALEXANDER: Just fine. I'm Mike McAlexander,  
14 Chief Deputy Prosecutor. We've submitted an  
15 amendment to the code regarding handling of money  
16 that is seized through the federal forfeiture assets,  
17 and essentially, I think, the--there's a similar  
18 ordinance that has been done on behalf of the  
19 Sheriff's Department. When we cooperate with this  
20 the federal law requires that we segregate these  
21 monies so that we can account for them fully to the  
22 federal government.  
23 IRVING: Great. I'll entertain a motion, unless  
24 there's any questions.  
25 ROUSSEAU: I don't have any questions. I make a

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1 motion that we approve Mr. McAlexander's request.  
2 IRVING: I will second that motion. All in favor say  
3 "aye."  
4 ROUSSEAU: Aye.  
5 IRVING: Aye. Motion passed, and congratulations on  
6 your new position and best of luck.  
7 MR. MCALEXANDER: Well thank you very much.  
8 IRVING: Thank you very much. Item number three on  
9 the agenda is appointment of the Director of Allen  
10 County Homeland Security. Good morning, Mr.  
11 LaRocque. How are you this morning?  
12 LAROCQUE: Good morning. My name is Ed LaRocque, and  
13 I'm the Allen County Emergency Management Director.  
14 And if you don't mind, would you allow me a minute  
15 for a short statement?  
16 IRVING: I think the events that have happened in  
17 last 24 hours, I would entertain any type of  
18 information you could provide for us.  
19 LAROCQUE: Thanks. First, I wanted to publicly thank  
20 the Commissioners for your support and interest in  
21 Emergency Management and Homeland Security. It's

22 made our job in our office much easier because of  
23 your interest and participation in these activities.  
24 As you know, you appointed me to the position of  
25 Emergency Management Director in the spring of 1999.

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1 And under state statute and local county ordinances,  
2 our office is responsible for the planning, the  
3 mitigation, the response, and the recovery of any  
4 natural, man-made, technological, or war-related  
5 disaster. In conjunction with that, the state  
6 realizes that that is our fiduciary and legal  
7 responsibilities and therefore half of our staff's  
8 salaries are reimbursed through the state on a yearly  
9 basis. Not all of our expenses, but, you know, but  
10 the normal salaries and things associated with that.

11 Starting in the spring of '99, shortly after  
12 my appointment, the federal government started  
13 domestic preparedness training--

14 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).

15 LAROCQUE: --which, today is called, "Homeland  
16 Security." In the summer of that year, we started  
17 sending folks through our office, to various federal  
18 training programs for terrorism preparedness. Since  
19 that period of time, we've sent over four dozen  
20 people in the city and the state--or excuse me, in  
21 the city and the county, various emergency services,  
22 elected officials, and department heads, to Fort  
23 McClellan, Alabama for several different classes in  
24 terrorism preparedness.

25 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).

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1 LAROCQUE: Also, in August of 1999, through an  
2 opportunity presented to our office from the Federal  
3 Emergency Management Agency, we were able to send  
4 almost 50 people to Mount Weather, Virginia--

5 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).

6 LAROCQUE: --which is one of F.E.M.A.'s training  
7 sites. Mr. Rousseau was able to go along with us on  
8 that. For--

9 IRVING: Can--can I interject for a moment--

10 LAROCQUE: You may.

11 IRVING: --I think that since you mentioned Mr.  
12 Rousseau, I think we have a few more here in the  
13 audience that maybe were--that went to--Cookie, did  
14 you go? Is there anybody else in the audience that  
15 went?

16 ELSER: Loren did.

17 IRVING: Loren did.

18 ROUSSEAU: Loren Robertson.

19 IRVING: Okay, and so did--

20 ROUSSEAU: Tony Burrus.

21 IRVING: --Tony Burrus. Okay, and afterwards if you  
22 would like to add anything, feel free to. Go ahead,  
23 Ed.

24 LAROCQUE: And several folks from the Fort Wayne Fire  
25 Department, Fort Wayne Police Department, Fort Wayne

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1 Communications, County Sheriff's Department, County  
2 Communications, a very wide range--range of folks  
3 attended that week-long terrorism training session--a  
4 management training session. In 2000, the Nunn-Lugar

5 Domenici Terrorism Act came to Fort Wayne. The city  
6 appointed me as the point of contact for that to help  
7 coordinate that week of training for first  
8 responders. That included training in awareness, in  
9 operations, in hazardous materials, in incident  
10 command, and also training for the hospital emergency  
11 staff. We also helped coordinate, with the committee  
12 of city and county responders, two tabletop  
13 exercises.

14 Then in June of 2002, a continuation of Nunn-  
15 Lugar, I was the point of contact--our office was the  
16 point of contact and helped coordinate the largest  
17 training exercise--full scale training exercise that  
18 the city and the county have ever participated in.  
19 We had about 500 participants. And that was put  
20 together with a planning committee of about 25  
21 people--

22 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).

23 LAROCQUE: --of city, county, and state--state folks.  
24 There were participants in that program--in the  
25 training exercises, not only from the city and the

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1 county, but the state and various branches of the  
2 federal government as well. We have also been  
3 responsible through our office and a committee of  
4 folks to put together a vulnerability and risk  
5 assessment study about two years ago. And a new one  
6 has just been delivered to us, by the state, that  
7 we'll find out in March exactly what we want to do,  
8 but that will be a much more comprehensive risk and  
9 vulnerability assessment for all of the political  
10 subunits in Allen County.

11 We have been responsible in the past two  
12 years for--in conjunction with a committee of people,  
13 putting together the Terrorism Annex for the  
14 Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan for our  
15 community. We're also coordinating the federal  
16 program that will be making available personal  
17 protective equipment for all first responders,  
18 police, fire, EMS, in the--

19 IRVING: Great.

20 LAROCQUE: --community. We've also had the  
21 opportunity through our office to personally conduct  
22 numerous training sessions for--for first responders  
23 in terrorism awareness and operations. And we've  
24 also had the opportunity to make many presentations  
25 to civic and community groups in the same area. Our

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1 office is also charged, by the state, to be the point  
2 of contact for mutual aid within the state or--and  
3 within the federal government. If something would  
4 happen in the community, and we would need some  
5 outside help, all that help, by state statute, is  
6 supposed to be funneled through our office to the  
7 state, then to the various federal agencies that  
8 would be involved.

9 IRVING: Okay.

10 LAROCQUE: We're in the process right now of putting  
11 together an intercounty mutual aid agreement--

12 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).

13 LAROCQUE: --with all of the political subunits in

14 the county in order to help fulfill some F.E.M.A.  
15 requirements for disaster reimbursement. And you are  
16 aware of that and have already reviewed and approved  
17 of that document.

18 IRVING: Yes.

19 LAROCQUE: Adding terrorism and disaster preparedness  
20 information to the county website will be one of the  
21 next steps--

22 IRVING: Great.

23 LAROCQUE: --because of your leadership in helping  
24 develop and reinvigorate our county website, we now  
25 have the ability to put a lot of educational material

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1 that's available from F.E.M.A. and the Red Cross,  
2 either as a direct link on our website, or even put  
3 the information right there, so people don't even  
4 have to--have to make a link. The information will  
5 be right there on disaster and terrorism  
6 preparedness. So--so what you're doing today, in my  
7 opinion, is--is giving an affirmation and a  
8 recognition of what our office has already been doing  
9 since 1999.

10 IRVING: Ed, would you be having to add any new staff  
11 in order to fulfill your new title as being Director  
12 of Allen County Homeland Security?

13 LAROCQUE: No, because this--we've been participating  
14 in doing this, you know--

15 IRVING: Okay.

16 LAROCQUE: --since 1999 or 2000, so we're not really  
17 taking on any additional responsibility that we  
18 haven't already integrated into our--into our  
19 program.

20 IRVING: Okay. Ed, do you have any questions?

21 ROUSSEAU: No, I don't. I'm somewhat shocked by the  
22 conflict here and it's an amazing thing to be a part  
23 of local government as long as I have, and we've done  
24 a lot of things. City/County Board of Health, which  
25 the county finances, we have the City/County Billing

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1 Department which the county finances. During the  
2 Helmke administration, they even blessed us with the  
3 lockup. We have that expense. But I have--this is a  
4 new one for me. I've been a part of a lot of the  
5 activities that Mr. LaRocque has pointed out. I see  
6 Deborah McMahan, our City/County Health Officer, back  
7 there. She was on the trip to Mount Weather.

8 LAROCQUE: Yes, she was.

9 ROUSSEAU: And all of sudden--the only thing I can  
10 figure--it just struck me as I was sitting here, it  
11 may be an election year. I think, maybe that might  
12 be what it is, I'm not sure what it is, but anyhow, I  
13 wholeheartedly approve, and I would make a motion  
14 that we appoint Mr. LaRocque.

15 IRVING: Before I second your motion, Commissioner  
16 Rousseau, I saw that Dr. McMahan did walk in and  
17 Loren who's been here--is there anyone--are you here  
18 to say anything towards the Director of Homeland  
19 Security for Allen County? Would you like to add  
20 anything? No. Okay, I will second your motion. All  
21 in favor say "aye."

22 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

23 IRVING: Aye. Opposed? None. Motion's carried.  
24 Congratulations Ed, you're now the new Director of  
25 Allen County Homeland Security.

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1 LAROCQUE: Thank you very much.  
2 IRVING: Thank you.  
3 LAROCQUE: I appreciate it.  
4 IRVING: Okay, number four on our agenda. Approval  
5 of contract between Allen County and Verizon for  
6 video conferencing. Good morning, Cookie. How are  
7 you this morning?  
8 STEVENS: Good morning, Commissioners. I am  
9 wonderful, and I appreciate the opportunity to handle  
10 one more grant process that brings money into Allen  
11 County.  
12 IRVING: Why don't we just wait a moment while the  
13 press evacuates. I guess your video conferencing  
14 isn't as exciting, Cookie.  
15 STEVENS: I can understand why. The Homeland  
16 Security is very important.  
17 IRVING: That's true. Well, you've been involved in  
18 this too, so--  
19 STEVENS: Yes.  
20 IRVING: --we all have. And we're very proud of our  
21 progress.  
22 STEVENS: I'm sorry that I was--I was not available  
23 to go on the trip that we had--the week long  
24 educational process.  
25 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).

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1 STEVENS: I was--I had the opportunity to and missed  
2 out on it, so--but I'm sure that with Ed and Dr.  
3 McMahon and those that were involved, we are well  
4 prepared or well on our way to becoming prepared  
5 through that process.  
6 IRVING: Well, thank you very much.  
7 STEVENS: You're welcome.  
8 IRVING: Okay, let's talk about video conferencing  
9 with Verizon.  
10 STEVENS: Yes. The initiative to have video-  
11 teleconferencing brought to Allen County was  
12 initiated by the Immigration of Naturalization  
13 Services--  
14 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).  
15 STEVENS: --I.N.S., and we've been afforded \$75,000  
16 to implement our project here. Through the  
17 processes, we have worked with our telephone company  
18 that the Commissioners have and other--the judges and  
19 the prosecutors and so forth, and we've come up with  
20 the ability to accommodate our needs with the 75,000  
21 [\$75,000] that I.N.S. has--has offered us. And we're  
22 here to say that we recommend that you accept the  
23 contract with Verizon and we'll be able to move  
24 forward. The judges are looking quite forward to  
25 having this put together.

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1 IRVING: And would you give us the locations again  
2 where the video conferencing will be.  
3 STEVENS: The--the jail will have a system, the  
4 City/County Building will have a system and the  
5 Courthouse will have systems.

6 IRVING: Great--great. I'll entertain a motion.  
7 ROUSSEAU: So moved.  
8 IRVING: Seconded, all in favor say "aye."  
9 ROUSSEAU: Aye.  
10 IRVING: Aye. I also see--  
11 STEVENS: Thank you so much.  
12 IRVING: --that Matt's in the back, and I want--  
13 STEVENS: Yes.  
14 IRVING: --to thank Verizon for their hard efforts on  
15 this too.  
16 STEVENS: And our telephone--  
17 IRVING: And Marissa--  
18 STEVENS: --D & M.  
19 IRVING: --too.  
20 STEVENS: Yes.  
21 IRVING: Thank you very much. It's a project that  
22 we've been looking forward to completion.  
23 STEVENS: Thank you.  
24 IRVING: Number five on the agenda. Approval of  
25 precinct name changes. Oh, you happened to mention  
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1 an election, so is that why we're having precinct  
2 name changes? Was Ed ahead of you there, Pam?  
3 FINLAYSON: Pardon?  
4 IRVING: Was Ed ahead of you there?  
5 FINLAYSON: No, no.  
6 IRVING: Could you state your name and your title,  
7 please?  
8 FINLAYSON: I'm Pam Finlayson, Director of Elections  
9 for Allen County.  
10 IRVING: Glad to have you.  
11 FINLAYSON: You're welcome.  
12 ROUSSEAU: Can we kind of--is there anything we can  
13 say to make you happy?  
14 IRVING: She hates--  
15 FINLAYSON: I'm happy--  
16 IRVING: --TV.  
17 FINLAYSON: --already. I'm already happy.  
18 ROUSSEAU: All right.  
19 FINLAYSON: I'm going to be appearing before you  
20 again next Wednesday for a second stage of precinct--  
21 the next stage will be precinct boundary changes for  
22 the upcoming elections this year. This is simply a  
23 change of names for some of the precincts in the City  
24 of Fort Wayne to reflect their new district  
25 designations.

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1 IRVING: Okay.  
2 FINLAYSON: No boundaries have been changed on the  
3 supporting documentation you have on these precincts.  
4 So this is basically--when I submit this order to the  
5 Indiana Election Division, they just rubber stamp it  
6 since there are no boundary shifts.  
7 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).  
8 FINLAYSON: This is--this will basically be a  
9 notification to them of the new naming convention.  
10 IRVING: Okay.  
11 FINLAYSON: Now, next Wednesday I'll be presenting  
12 several changes that the Indiana Election Division  
13 has already begun to review. It looks real clean,  
14 they don't see any problems. And these will be

15 annexations for New Haven, Huntertown, and Fort  
16 Wayne.  
17 IRVING: Last week or the week before, Pam, we were  
18 given an update--I think it was last week, on our  
19 website as far as--for the election board and voter  
20 registration--  
21 FINLAYSON: Uh-huh (affirmative).  
22 IRVING: --as far as finding names. Our  
23 understanding was that that project will be complete  
24 after these name changes--  
25 FINLAYSON: Correct.

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1 IRVING: --are done. So when do you estimate that  
2 the new name changes can be inputted in the computer  
3 for assessibility for our constituents?  
4 FINLAYSON: Well, I'm going to begin that now.  
5 IRVING: Okay.  
6 FINLAYSON: We'll start updating our records now, and  
7 it looks like the changes we've already submitted  
8 look good. So I'll start putting that information  
9 into our system. I think by February--  
10 IRVING: Great.  
11 FINLAYSON: --we should be able to get that  
12 information to our vendor. They're ready to go. As  
13 soon as I can get the information to them. And then  
14 we can have an interactive section to the county  
15 website, where people can get their own information.  
16 IRVING: Okay.  
17 FINLAYSON: I think it will be very helpful.  
18 IRVING: So do you feel as if we will be 100% on the  
19 way for the primary in May?  
20 FINLAYSON: Oh, sure.  
21 IRVING: Great. Wonderful.  
22 FINLAYSON: I do--I--  
23 ROUSSEAU: 100%?  
24 IRVING: 100% was February, March, April, yeah. We  
25 can do this by May. Well, keep us informed.

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1 FINLAYSON: Oh, okay.  
2 IRVING: I will entertain a motion.  
3 ROUSSEAU: So moved.  
4 IRVING: Seconded, all in favor say "aye."  
5 ROUSSEAU: Aye.  
6 IRVING: Aye.  
7 FINLAYSON: Thank you.  
8 IRVING: Opposed? Motion carried.  
9 FINLAYSON: Thank you.  
10 IRVING: Thank you very much, Pam. Keep us informed.  
11 FINLAYSON: I will.  
12 IRVING: Item six, approve Change Order number 2 for  
13 the 2002 HMA Resurfacing Package number 3. Good  
14 morning, sir.  
15 FITCH: Good morning. Mike Fitch, Allen County  
16 Highway Department. This Change Order involves three  
17 projects. It'd be primarily the Wood Youth--or the  
18 Youth Services Center, the Adams Center roundabout,  
19 and the Minnich Road at I-69--or I-469 interchange  
20 improvements. Most of this change is due to the  
21 changes at the Minnich Road project. This project  
22 required several patches, some drainage improvements.  
23 The pavement was breaking up in several areas.

24 During construction, we found that there needed to be  
25 additional pavement removed and replaced. It was in

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1 much worse condition after we started excavating some  
2 of these areas. So this was additional material  
3 required to patch the pavement properly and put it  
4 back into serviceable condition. We hope this  
5 improvement will last 10, 15 years before we have to  
6 do any additional money--

7 IRVING: And the Change Order--

8 FITCH: --put any additional money in the project.

9 IRVING: --is for \$66,616.97.

10 ROUSSEAU: So moved.

11 IRVING: I'll second that motion. All in favor say  
12 "aye."

13 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

14 IRVING: Aye.

15 IRVING: Opposed? Motion carried. Number seven on  
16 the agenda. Approval and acceptance of contract
