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1 IRVING: Good morning. Thank you for attending our
2 February 26th Legislative Session. Agenda item
3 number one, Approval of the Minutes of the February
4 19th meeting.
5 ROUSSEAU: So moved.
6 BLOOM: Second.
7 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."
8 ROUSSEAU: Aye.
9 IRVING: Aye.
10 BLOOM: Aye.
11 IRVING: Motion carried. Agenda item number two,
12 Amendment to the Title 12/Article 73, Allen County
13 Juvenile Justice and Detention Center Placement Fund.
14 I think we have a couple visitors here.
15 SIMS: Can we?
16 IRVING: You sure can, Judge, and Reverend. And,
17 we'll let your introduce yourselves.
18 SIMS: Well, pastors first.
19 LATHAM: Well, I'm Pastor Latham, Pastor of
20 Renaissance Baptist Church, and the President of the
21 N.A.A.C.P. And, excuse me, I didn't comb my hair. I
22 was rushing to get down here, so--
23 IRVING: The TV cameras love--
24 LATHAM: --appreciate the compliment.
25 IRVING: --you no matter what.

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1 LATHAM: Well, thank you. I don't know about that,
2 but I appreciate your comment.
3 SIMS: And, I'm Steve Sims. I'm a--the Judge in the
4 Family Relations Division of the Allen Superior
5 Court. Thanks for having us this morning.
6 IRVING: Great. Would you like to explain a little
7 bit about--to refresh everyone's memory. I think
8 this was brought before the Commissioners for the
9 first time in, what, November was it? Something like
10 that?
11 ELSER: I think so.
12 SIMS: I look at Mr. Fishing, he nods, yes. That
13 sounds right.
14 IRVING: Okay.
15 SIMS: And, after that, there were concerns. In
16 fact, the pastor had concerns, so let me have him
17 express those, and then we can talk about where we
18 went from there.
19 IRVING: Okay.
20 SIMS: Will that work?
21 LATHAM: Yes, sir, that's fine.
22 SIMS: Okay.
23 LATHAM: We're just concerned about jail fees. It
24 was about four or five years ago, and this situation
25 came up, and we wanted to at least express our

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1 concern. We're concerned about the poor that's not
2 able to do things. But, on the same token, we do
3 understand the--the issue with the County, and
4 budgets, and that you have to have monies to--to run
5 the system. And we do understand that it costs a lot
6 to do that, and Commissioner Rousseau has made it
7 very clear to us on several occasions how much money
8 it costs him, it is very expensive. And we certainly
9 appreciate doing that, but I do appreciate the fact
10 that the Judge and the Commissioners did hear our
11 concern, and the Judge and I, and Judge Pratt, we did
12 get together and we did talk several times about how
13 we can work it out, at least where the poor in our
14 community would have an opportunity to not suffer
15 anymore. And, also, we didn't want the County to
16 suffer any more than it had to, so I just want to
17 thank the Judge here for cooperating with us, and
18 working things out with us and--

19 BLOOM: Super.

20 LATHAM: --I want to thank both--all three of you for
21 also--especially Marla, for kind of putting us
22 together and talking with us. I just appreciate your
23 leadership, and appreciate the fact that when we came
24 that you know I didn't have a complaint, but I had a
25 concern. And I think that's a big difference in

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1 having a complaint and a concern. And you guys
2 listened, and you responded to us quite well and
3 we're here to say, "Thank you." And we certainly
4 support what the Judge is going to present to you
5 today.

6 IRVING: And I think if my memory--just one moment,
7 Judge.

8 SIMS: No, no, absolutely.

9 IRVING: If my memory serves me right, after the
10 meeting that we had, I think that you and some of the
11 other ministers got a special tour, too, didn't they?

12 LATHAM: Yeah, we did. We went over the whole
13 system--the whole new center, and it's much larger
14 than what I thought, in fact, it was kind of exciting
15 to walk through with the Judge to--

16 ROUSSEAU: It's much larger than we thought too,
17 Judge.

18 LATHAM: Yeah, it's--it's--well, it's really huge.

19 BLOOM: Way to go, Ed.

20 LATHAM: And just to go through there--and just to--

21 IRVING: I'll give you five on that one. I will have
22 to say that, go ahead, Reverend.

23 LATHAM: --you know, and to have him to explain what
24 will be done, that was very exciting. And I think
25 the--the--I don't want to call it the Wood Youth

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1 Center, I wanted to call it the proper name.

2 SIMS: Juvenile--Juvenile Justice Center.

3 LATHAM: The Juvenile Justice Center will be an asset
4 to our community.

5 BLOOM: We haven't named it yet.

6 LATHAM: And, also, you know, I--I do understand that
7 we're having a budget problem, but I would like for
8 us to work with Judge Sims as much as possible,

9 because I feel that if we have things in place for
10 young people, while we have them, then perhaps we can
11 keep them from going to the adult system. And, I
12 think the Judge has some things in place that can
13 help do that. In fact, if we spend a couple of
14 million to save one child, I think it's quite worth
15 it, to be quite frank with you. So, I'm excited
16 about the whole process, I'm excited about today, and
17 just excited that we've got people in this community
18 that are willing to work together to make things
19 happen for the positive, so--

20 ROUSSEAU: That statement, though, brings another
21 thing to my mind. I know we have this ordinance in
22 it, and it reads specifically, the Juvenile Justice
23 system, I believe--

24 SIMS: And the--and the sister ordinance with the
25 Youth Services System. It--it immediately--and any

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1 fees collected, either at the Youth Services Center,
2 or at the Wood/Juvenile Justice Center, one-half
3 immediately goes, on a daily basis, to the Allen
4 County General Fund to--to bring relief in what
5 everybody knows is pretty tough economic times. The
6 other half is reserved to those institutions to
7 continue to provide services and defray those costs
8 without going to the Allen County General Fund.
9 After meeting with the pastors on several occasions,
10 I appreciate the Commissioners making Bill Fishing
11 available as a counsel. He was gracious, on behalf
12 of the Commissioners, to meet, and redrafted the
13 language. And, the language that we put in, of
14 course, went from a subjective standard, which we
15 left, into an objective standard, and in many ways
16 paralleled the jail bill, so that if there's a change
17 in Judges, or--or other matters, that there's a floor
18 that protects people.

19 ROUSSEAU: Now, the--because I haven't, you know,
20 know--I don't know every detail here--

21 SIMS: Right.

22 ROUSSEAU: --we have another ordinance, as I
23 recollect, that deals with the adult facility--

24 SIMS: That's true. The jail?

25 ROUSSEAU: --and--

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1 SIMS: Yes.

2 ROUSSEAU: --to the best of my remembrance, we've
3 collected somewhere from 500 [\$500.00] to \$1500.00
4 over a period of several years.

5 SIMS: Right.

6 ROUSSEAU: And I'm wondering if a similar change in
7 the ordinance for the adult facility is what--pardon
8 me, whether or not that would, you know, make an--I
9 guess there was some--apparently some kind of a
10 verbal agreement between folks, that they just simply
11 wouldn't do anything about that ordinance, and I
12 believe that--

13 SIMS: I--I wasn't part of the negotiations in that
14 matter, which took place with the criminal division,
15 but let me express an opinion that I believe is in
16 the interest of justice, and also in the interest of
17 --of saying publicly, particularly in hard times

18 where County Commissioners and County Council members
19 are struggling to find two pennies to do anything to
20 run government. The jail ordinance bill that was
21 passed, it allows charging up to \$30.00 a day, and I
22 think the County passed an ordinance of--was it 25
23 [\$25.00]--20 [\$20.00], \$25.00. It exempts people
24 that are held for the first three days. And--and, it
25 was good bill. That was a compromise provision that

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1 went in, in order to get the bill through. But what
2 I would suggest is that part of the practical impact
3 is that the people who can afford to post a couple
4 thousand dollar bond, like that, and get out, are the
5 very class of people for the first three days that
6 are totally exempted from a penny. The poor man who
7 can't post any bond to get out, who remains in jail,
8 then the fee becomes assessed against him after 72
9 hours. Most people, if they can pay 25 bucks, or,
10 you know, or whatever it is, are going to be out.
11 One of the things that I would like to see, that I've
12 encouraged--that I've encouraged, I would like to see
13 the ordinance for the Allen County Jail amended so
14 that--that, you know, when a police officer picks a
15 man up, if--and, excuse me, but if he vomits on the
16 floor, if he has to hassle with him for four or five
17 hours running breathalyzer tests, and cleaning up
18 after him, and feed him, and there's no charge
19 whatsoever, because he's out in 72 hours. So I think
20 there's a problem with it, with the very class of
21 people that can pay are exempted from the statute for
22 the first 72 hours. That could be set up on a cash
23 bond basis where the Sheriff is authorized, by Order,
24 to release if they pay the \$25.00, or the 50 [\$50.00]
25 or the 75 [\$75.00]. And, so you--I don't think one

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1 would need it. And, part of the things I've done,
2 because I'm Chief Judge, as well, is I've tried to
3 look as to what County Council asked the
4 Commissioners to look to see what they could do,
5 therefore, the Youth Services Fund. They asked the
6 courts and others, and therefore are joining. But,
7 one of the things, I think that--that would--that
8 would definitely help, and I think that those fees
9 could be collected without much fuss or muss.

10 ROUSSEAU: Well, I'm sure that you're aware that--

11 SIMS: Nor will I answer the way you needed, Ed.
12 All right.

13 ROUSSEAU: --we're interested in--in making changes
14 in the Bill so that the money, if properly filled
15 out, and apparently there's been an agreement here,
16 that that be used--those accommodations be made into
17 our other ordinance, so that--so that in cases where
18 it's--which is all that we've ever meant for it to
19 be--

20 SIMS: Right.

21 ROUSSEAU: --for those who can afford to pay it.
22 Those accommodations can be made for--in order to
23 collect money for the--for the, what, criminal
24 division, is that what you're calling it, whatever?

25 SIMS: Well--

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1 ROUSSEAU: What do you call the other branch--you're
2 the Juvenile, what do you call the other one?
3 SIMS: Since Fran Gull is Executive Judge, I just
4 say, "Yes, ma'am," most of the time. But, it would
5 be the Allen Superior Court Criminal Division.
6 ROUSSEAU: Yeah. Well, that--I'd suggest that if we
7 could work that, and use similar verbiage, that might
8 be able help.
9 IRVING: Well--
10 SIMS: Well, yes.
11 IRVING: --well, why don't we do this. Since our
12 attorney is here, and has heard the entire
13 conversation, maybe we can suggest that he pull the
14 ordinance and that we look at it, since he worked on
15 the juvenile and the youth, and then we will get
16 with--you're saying, Judge Gull, correct?
17 SIMS: No, I--well, Judge Gull, but I think one needs
18 to get with the State Legislature. You passed
19 everything you could pass, to the best of my
20 knowledge.
21 IRVING: Okay.
22 SIMS: But, the Bill creating the authority for the
23 jail says that the counties may not impose for the
24 first three days.
25 IRVING: I don't know. I wasn't here at the time.

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1 SIMS: I think that needs to be changed, not by this
2 body, not by the Allen County Council. I think that
3 we need an amendment down state to correct that.
4 IRVING: Okay.
5 SIMS: And, I would have to ask--
6 ROUSSEAU: Well, all we have--
7 SIMS: --this pastor--
8 ROUSSEAU: --to do--
9 SIMS: --do you disagree with that?
10 LATHAM: No.
11 ROUSSEAU: --Judge, is--all we have to do is just ask
12 them down there, and they do anything we ask them to
13 do now, so--
14 SIMS: Well, but there's--and--and Pastor Latham--
15 IRVING: Well, then let's get the ordinance pulled
16 and let's--
17 BLOOM: Ed?
18 SIMS: --well, Pastor Latham is here, and I think
19 it's important--I mean I've asked him, and we've had
20 discussions in our other discussion, I do not
21 believe--
22 BLOOM: They do anything we ask.
23 IRVING: Sure.
24 SIMS: --I don't believe that Pastor--I believe
25 Pastor Latham would support that, is that true?

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1 LATHAM: Yes, I would definitely support that.
2 BLOOM: Well, let's take it, let's look at it--
3 SIMS: Okay,
4 IRVING: --and our legislative assistant should--
5 legislative liaison should be here on Friday, so why
6 don't we take a look at it and we'll see what we can
7 do.
8 SIMS: Thank you.

9 ROUSSEAU: Thank you very much.
10 SIMS: No, thank you.
11 IRVING: I think, unless there's anything to add, I
12 think I'm--
13 ROUSSEAU: So moved.
14 IRVING: --would entertain a motion here.
15 ROUSSEAU: So moved.
16 BLOOM: Second.
17 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."
18 ROUSSEAU: Aye.
19 BLOOM: Aye.
20 IRVING: Aye. Motion passed. Thank you very much.
21 Is that on both this and the Wood--and the Youth
22 Services--
23 IRVING: No. And--
24 SIMS: Okay. I'll get out of your way.
25 BLOOM: Youth Services, no.

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1 IRVING: --we have Youth Services and, I will make--
2 I'll make--
3 SIMS: Kenny Watson's here. By the way, thank you
4 all very much.
5 ROUSSEAU: Thank you.
6 SIMS: Well, thanks.
7 LATHAM: Thank you very much.
8 SIMS: Pastor, thanks.
9 LATHAM: Thank you, sir. Appreciate it.
10 SIMS: I'll look for that date.
11 LATHAM: Thank you.
12 IRVING: --well, an Amendment to Title 12/Article 74
13 for the Youth Service Placement Fund. Mr. Watson is
14 here.
15 BLOOM: Okay.
16 IRVING: Okay. Thank you very much.
17 BLOOM: Good morning.
18 WATSON: Good morning.
19 FISHERING: Good morning--
20 IRVING: Good morning, and how are you?
21 FISHERING: --ladies and gentleman. Bill Fishering,
22 the County attorney.
23 WATSON: Ken Watson, Executive Director of Youth
24 Services Center.
25 FISHERING: This before you now is a parallel

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1 amendment to the Youth Services Center ordinance.
2 Mr. Watson and Mr. Feighner, who represents that
3 board, worked with Judge Sims and Pastor Latham to
4 arrive at this modification. You will find it to be
5 virtually identical. The only real difference
6 between the two ordinances, when it gets right down
7 to it, is the Commissioners control this particular
8 fund, where the Superior Court Judge, Juvenile
9 Relations Division, controls the other fund, with
10 these amendments. So I guess we would recommend that
11 you approve these amendments and that we move forward
12 with this process.
13 IRVING: And the other on this added, if I'm correct,
14 Mr. Watson, too, we've made allocations for the
15 Kryder House and the Yoder House, too, which that
16 would--

17 WATSON: That is correct. That is--
18 IRVING: --not be--
19 WATSON: --that is one of the big differences,
20 because 100% of those revenues do go to the general
21 fund. In other words, they are not split, they all
22 go to the general fund.
23 IRVING: I'll entertain a motion, please.
24 ROUSSEAU: So moved.
25 BLOOM: Second.
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1 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."
2 ROUSSEAU: Aye.
3 IRVING: Aye.
4 BLOOM: Aye.
5 IRVING: Motion carried. Thank you very much.
6 WATSON: Thank you very much.
7 IRVING: Agenda item number four, Consent to the Town
8 of Zanesville to annex approximately 50 acres of land
9 adjacent to the current town limits. Well, good
10 morning.
11 BLOOM: Good morning.
12 IRVING: How are you?
13 BROCK: I'm fine, thank you. Thank you very much for
14 entertaining this.
15 IRVING: Could you introduce yourself?
16 BLOOM: I certainly will. I'm Patsy Brock. I'm the
17 President of the Zanesville Town Council. And, I'm
18 here to request, from the Allen County Commissioners,
19 permission to annex approximately 51 acres into the
20 Town of Zanesville.
21 ROUSSEAU: I wasn't aware--I wasn't aware that--that
22 we had our oar in that water, but according to
23 something I've just read this morning, it says that
24 you do, and so that being the case I make a motion
25 that we approve your annexation.

1 BLOOM: I'll second that motion.
2 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."
3 ROUSSEAU: Aye.
4 BLOOM: Aye.
5 IRVING: Aye. Motion carried.
6 BROCK: Thank you very much.
7 IRVING: If I move to Zanesville, will I get such a
8 beautiful accent too?
9 BROCK: Only if you come via Texas.
10 IRVING: Via Texas. Well, the weather's about the
11 same, right?
12 BROCK: Definitely. Thank you very much.
13 IRVING: Thank you very much.
14 ROUSSEAU: I like this woman, right there, I like
15 her.
16 IRVING: That's right. Agenda item number five,
17 Annual Approval of the Snow and/or Ice Emergency
18 Level and Notification Plan for Unincorporated Allen
19 County.
20 BLOOM: We have a new--
21 IRVING: Are you going to read the changes?
22 BLOOM: --a new proposal here in front of us.
23 ROUSSEAU: Has she got it?
24 BLOOM: We amended--I don't have it.
25 ELSER: I can--

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1 BLOOM: It's basically to clarify the notification,
2 so that we're not all fumbling and stumbling. It
3 never really clarified the notification process, and
4 if you want to read those, please.

5 IRVING: The two changes that were made on this was,
6 "Notification, Highway Director and Sheriff notify
7 the President of the Allen County Commissioners. If
8 the President is not available, the Vice President
9 shall be notified, and then the Secretary of the
10 Board of Commissioners." And, the other thing that
11 was added, "With the recommendation of the Sheriff
12 and/or Highway Director, only one Commissioner,
13 preferably the President is needed to lift the snow
14 emergency." And, since this will be coming before us
15 on a yearly basis, in January, I think that it would
16 be--since the president changes and rotates amongst
17 the three Commissioners, when this comes before
18 January, the new president will be listed and in our
19 handbook. I'll entertain a motion.

20 BLOOM: So moved.

21 ROUSSEAU: Second.

22 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."

23 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

24 BLOOM: Aye.

25 IRVING: Aye. Motion carried.

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1 ROUSSEAU: I did see something on television where
2 one of our surrounding communities suggested that
3 they had a--a regular, like a traffic light, red,
4 yellow, and green. And we might keep that in mind,
5 maybe if we have that, maybe that will be more easily
6 recognized as, you know, what the weather condition
7 is, you know.

8 BLOOM: And where would those be?

9 IRVING: Well--

10 ROUSSEAU: Well, what the--I saw something on
11 television where one of the surrounding communities
12 and they used a red, yellow, or green, like a traffic
13 light. Green that's okay, yellow is--

14 BLOOM: Oh, I see, just verbiage.

15 IRVING: Just verbiage.

16 BLOOM: Not--not a--

17 ROUSSEAU: --yeah, and red is a please don't, kind of
18 a thing, and--

19 IRVING: Yes--Commissioner Rousseau, you and I must
20 be on the same track. Yesterday, I had a meeting
21 with Ed LaRocque, our Emergency Management Director,
22 and he is going to get some data together for us on
23 surrounding counties, and also the counties on the
24 other side in Ohio, because this is a conflict that
25 was brought up by the media, that we have a level

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1 one, two, and three, but other counties have a level
2 one, two, and three, but their level one is the
3 maximum what our level three is. And also the
4 colors, as you had said. So, I even suggested to Mr.
5 LaRocque, that maybe we could look at like a red
6 alert, level one, which might even encompass
7 everything, and then everybody would understand it.

8 So, he is going to propose something to us and we'd
9 also like to, maybe get the support of the--one of
10 our legislators to carry it statewide.
11 ROUSSEAU: Well, we're always--this Commissioner's
12 court is always working toward improving things--
13 IRVING: Yes--
14 ROUSSEAU: --aren't we?
15 IRVING: --we sure are.
16 ROUSSEAU: We're not--
17 IRVING: And making--and simplifying things.
18 ROUSSEAU: --we're not living inside of that box,
19 we're outside of the box.
20 BLOOM: Well, it doesn't sound like simplifying if we
21 keep changing all the time.
22 ROUSSEAU: Oh.
23 BLOOM: I mean, it's just confusing the living
24 daylights out of me. Every time I turn around it's
25 changed.

1 IRVING: So, in other words--
2 ROUSSEAU: You don't drive--you don't drive in the
3 snow, anyhow.
4 BLOOM: This is true.
5 IRVING: --oh, I misunderstood you. I thought maybe
6 you meant that I should be President of the
7 Commissioners all the time. That changing was
8 confusing to you.
9 ROUSSEAU: I don't think we can work that in.
10 BLOOM: That's a horrifying idea.
11 IRVING: Okay.
12 BLOOM: Moving right along here.
13 IRVING: We did vote on that?
14 BLOOM: Yeah, we did.
15 IRVING: Okay, agenda six, Contract between the Board
16 of Commissioners and surrounding counties for
17 availability of at least one bed for the detention of
18 juvenile offenders at the Wood Youth Center. And,
19 this contract is for Adams, DeKalb, LaGrange, Noble,
20 Steuben, Wells, and Whitley. It--
21 BLOOM: I'll make a motion that we accept this. This
22 is a continuance of past contracts.
23 ROUSSEAU: I second it. And, they pay a yearly
24 amount of money into that--
25 BLOOM: \$5,000.00.

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1 ROUSSEAU: --seems like it was 5,000 [\$5,000.00]--
2 BLOOM: Five thousand [\$5,000.00].
3 ROUSSEAU: --and then they pay for each day they're
4 in there, so--
5 BLOOM: That's correct.
6 ELSER: \$70.00.
7 IRVING: And under a discussion item of that, I would
8 like to add that when our new Wood Youth Center is
9 open we will be discussing those fees, but right now
10 they're the same fees that we've had. All in favor
11 say, "aye."
12 ROUSSEAU: Aye.
13 BLOOM: Aye.
14 IRVING: Aye. Opposed? (No response.) Motion
15 carried. Number seven, Appointment to the Common
16 Wage Committee for the Fort Wayne, Allen County

17 Airport Authority for the construction of two T-
18 Hangars at the Fort Wayne Airport.

19 BLOOM: So moved.

20 ROUSSEAU: Second.

21 IRVING: Do you want to know who they are?

22 ROUSSEAU: No.

23 IRVING: Okay. All in favor say, "aye."

24 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

25 BLOOM: Aye.

1 IRVING: Aye. Opposed? (No response.) Motion
2 carried. Appointment to the Common Wage Committee
3 for the MSD of the Southwest Allen School System for
4 projects pursuant to the application.

5 BLOOM: Who put that word in there?

6 IRVING: Susan.

7 BLOOM: So moved.

8 ROUSSEAU: Second.

9 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."

10 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

11 BLOOM: Aye.

12 IRVING: Aye.

13 ROUSSEAU: Now, Marla--

14 IRVING: I'm sorry?

15 ROUSSEAU: --all of sudden there's a document here
16 that has me as president, is there something happened
17 here that I didn't know about?

18 BLOOM: I was just hoping.

19 IRVING: It's quite old.

20 ROUSSEAU: Oh.

21 ELSER: I will make sure those are corrected.

22 ROUSSEAU: Okay. Thank you.

23 BLOOM: I'm kidding--

24 IRVING: Because--

25 BLOOM: --I'm kidding.

0030

1 IRVING: --it was two years ago that you were
2 president, wasn't it?

3 ROUSSEAU: I don't know.

4 BLOOM: Let's get on.

5 IRVING: Okay. Excuse me.

6 BLOOM: Do it.

7 IRVING: Agenda item number seven (sic, nine)
8 Appointment to the Property Tax Assessment Board of
9 Appeals.

10 BLOOM: And that person is?

11 ELSER: Rebecca A. Merz. She is a Level Two
12 Assessor/Appraiser, and has that certification from
13 the Department of Local Government Finance.

14 BLOOM: This is great. I'll make a motion we accept
15 Rebecca Merz.

16 ROUSSEAU: And I second it. But, this doesn't have
17 anything to do with the snow emergency--

18 BLOOM: Merz.

19 ROUSSEAU: --if you're a level two?

20 IRVING: That's right.

21 BLOOM: No.

22 ROUSSEAU: Okay.

9 ELSER: Here they--Commissioner Bloom, here they are.
10 BLOOM: --Commissioner.
11 ROUSSEAU: I'm sorry.
12 IRVING: Commissioner Bloom, there are all your
13 change orders.
14 BLOOM: Thank you. The first change order is for
15 \$724.50, it's for some more circuit breakers. And,
16 the second change, to Weigand Construction, is
17 strictly an even out here. So, the total is \$724.50.
18 I'll make a motion we accept these changes.
19 ROUSSEAU: Second.
20 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."
21 BLOOM: Aye.
22 IRVING: Aye.
23 ROUSSEAU: Aye.
24 IRVING: Motion carried. Eleven, Change Order for
25 pursuit vehicles for the Allen County Police

1 Department. And as our illustrious purchasing
2 director is walking up, I'd like to be the first to
3 wish him "Happy Birthday" on TV.
4 LITTLE: Well, thank you.
5 ROTH: Happy Birthday, Bruce.
6 BLOOM: Happy Birthday, Bruce.
7 LITTLE: Thank you very much.
8 BLOOM: How old are you, Bruce?
9 IRVING: Oh, Linda.
10 ROUSSEAU: You don't have to answer that.
11 BLOOM: Yeah, but he looks so cute. Look how cute he
12 looks.
13 ROUSSEAU: We want to know what both of your ages
14 are, that's what I want.
15 ROTH: Together?
16 IRVING: Now, remember TV adds 10 years to you--
17 LITTLE: Yeah, add them together.
18 ROTH: It's over--
19 IRVING: --10 pounds, 10 years.
20 BLOOM: Anyway, what do we got here?
21 LITTLE: Two weeks ago the Board of Commissioners
22 awarded a contract to Valley Chevrolet for 13 pursuit
23 vehicles for use by the Sheriff's Department. Now,
24 it's time for us to place the purchase order, and
25 there's a couple of modifications we'd like to make

1 on a couple of these vehicles before we send that in.
2 We do want to delete one spotlight from one of the
3 vehicles, at a savings of \$192.00. We're going to
4 delete one set of full wheel covers from one vehicle,
5 for a deduction of \$95.00. And, we want to add an
6 option to all 13 vehicles, that was not originally
7 priced on the bid. This option is the addition of

8 front and rear power distribution centers to the
9 vehicles, and that would be at a cost of \$274.30 per
10 vehicle.

11 BLOOM: Yeah.

12 LITTLE: The net change to the contract is \$3,278.90.

13 ROUSSEAU: Now, this was not something that we didn't
14 know from the beginning, it was a--it's a legal
15 procedure that we have to go through, and when we
16 made the selections we had to purchase the cars on
17 one move, and then do the change orders on another,
18 so--

19 LITTLE: That's correct. This is an option--

20 ROUSSEAU: --it's not a surprise for us.

21 LITTLE: --that's right. This is an option we'd
22 requested in the bid, but the--there was a
23 misunderstanding on the dealers part as to what we
24 were asking for. The addition of this option in no
25 way begins to affect the outcome of the bids. This

5 FITCH: Good morning. Mike Fitch, Allen County
6 Highway Department. The highway department is
7 currently developing design plans for the Leo and
8 Mayhew Road project. As part of that project, we are
9 coordinating this work with INDOT's project at Tonkel
10 and State Route 1. And, also, we are working with
11 some of the businesses at that intersection, Dupont
12 Crossing. There are some entrance changes. And, as
13 part of that we're going to be doing some--a traffic
14 study to determine whether they--they have requested
15 additional access on State Route 1, so we're doing a
16 traffic study to determine what the impact of closing
17 crossings and putting new--or, closing entrances and
18 putting new entrances in, so that's part of this
19 change order to ask our consultant to do that traffic
20 study.

21 BLOOM: So will there be any contribution from the
22 development there, or--

23 FITCH: At this time, we have not discussed any.

24 BLOOM: All right.

25 FITCH: It's concerns about losing access to--

2 FITCH: --Dupont Crossings. They have a full access
3 crossing on--

4 BLOOM: And this will be an in and out?

5 FITCH: --Leo Road and we would be making that a
6 right in and right out, and so--

7 BLOOM: Yeah.

8 FITCH: --they feel that we--they need--

9 BLOOM: We should put--

10 FITCH: --to have another--

11 BLOOM: --yeah.

12 FITCH: --access. So, we're looking at ways to solve
13 that problem.

16 FITCH: Yes, there's a new development, a shopping

22 FITCH: And that's going to impact the traffic out

2 increase of 20,200 [\$20,200.00].

3 ROUSSEAU: Second.

4 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."

5 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

6 BLOOM: Aye.

7 IRVING: Aye. Motion carried. Approve traffic
8 posting change on Ridge Crest Crossing at West
9 Hamilton Road, in Bridgewater Addition.

10 BLOOM: So moved.

11 ROUSSEAU: Second.

12 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."

13 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

14 BLOOM: Aye.

15 IRVING: Aye. Motion carried. Approve and award Bid
16 Reference, #03-03, Bituminous Patching Material.

17 BLOOM: I don't have a copy of that.

18 IRVING: These were just opened yesterday aft--
19 yesterday morning.

20 FITCH: We received--this is our annual bid for
21 patching material. We received bids from API
22 Construction, Brooks Construction, E&B Paving, Wayne
23 Asphalt, Niblock Excavating, and Phend & Brown, Inc.
24 We reviewed the bids. Typically, what we've done on
25 these projects, we've awarded these projects to all

0039

1 the bidders, and we use the low bid for each category
2 for these materials. If we cannot obtain the
3 material for some reason or other from the low
4 bidder, we go to the next low bidder. So, we,
5 essentially, accept all bids. This year, the
6 patching material, we see an increase of about 10%
7 increase from last years bids.

8 IRVING: 10%?

9 BLOOM: 10% increase?

10 FITCH: Net. This materials are hot and cold asphalt
11 mix that we--

12 BLOOM: Right.

13 FITCH: --use for patching our roadways.

14 BLOOM: So moved.

15 ROUSSEAU: Second.

16 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."

17 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

18 BLOOM: Aye.

19 IRVING: Aye. Sixteen, Approve and award Bid
20 Reference #04-03, on Liquid Bituminous Material, and
21 these were also opened yesterday at 10:30.

22 FITCH: Yes. We received bids from Koch Materials,
23 Princeton [sic, Pierceton] Trucking, Marathon Ashland
24 Petroleum Company, and Bit-Mat Products. Again, we
25 accepted all bids. The--the prices on the liquid

0040

1 material went up--for their dust control material,
2 it went up 15%--

3 IRVING: Oh, really?

4 FITCH: --from \$95.00 to \$108.00, on an average, like
5 I say, between the bidders. Reseal and conversion,
6 which is our chip/seal liquid, that we use for our

7 chip/seal projects, went up from 20 [20%] to 25%,
8 went from 167 [\$167.00] up to 197 [\$197.00]. And for
9 our crack sealing, this is sealing of cracks in our
10 concrete pavement and asphalt pavement, it went up
11 25%. It went from \$200.00 up to \$250.00. So, we see
12 a--substantial increases, and I think that reflects,
13 you know, the gasoline prices.

14 BLOOM: How is this going to affect the total cost to
15 the department, especially, like on dust day here,
16 what do you think, can you tell--

17 FITCH: The material cost--

18 BLOOM: --from what we've--

19 FITCH: --on our projects are typically somewhere
20 around 35 [35%] to 45% of the total project costs.
21 The remaining being labor and other materials.

22 BLOOM: Right.

23 FITCH: So--so, this will definitely have 15% on top
24 of that. We'll--

25 BLOOM: I'd like to see some--

0041

1 FITCH: --definitely reduce the--

2 BLOOM: --estimates on--

3 FITCH: --impact our cost.

4 BLOOM: --because you know how many miles of roads we
5 do and--

6 FITCH: Right, right.

7 BLOOM: --I need to see what kind of an increase this
8 is.

9 FITCH: Yeah.

10 BLOOM: It's just another increase to the taxpayers,
11 you know, we're--

12 FITCH: Right. Now, this is a--you know, this
13 contract is--there's an escalating clause in the
14 contract, which means that if the prices go down--

15 BLOOM: Yeah, likely--

16 FITCH: --then they can--

17 BLOOM: --chance of that.

18 FITCH: --submit--resubmit prices--

19 BLOOM: Yeah--

20 FITCH: --to show--

21 BLOOM: --no, I know.

22 FITCH: --the prices went down, so--

23 BLOOM: I know.

24 IRVING: And what year--

25 FITCH: Not likely.

1 IRVING: --did we ever get prices to go down?

2 BLOOM: No, we've had ch--we've had price changes
3 before.

4 FITCH: We've had some--we've had--

5 BLOOM: Yeah.

6 FITCH: --we've had some in the past, now--

7 IRVING: Good.

8 BLOOM: Yeah, we have.

9 IRVING: Way to go.

10 FITCH: --right now, they say the prices are being,
11 you know, pushed up because of the war in--

12 BLOOM: Exactly.

13 FITCH: --proposed war in Iraq, so we don't know.

14 But, by accepting all the bids, I would think that if
15 the prices do go down, one or the other--because it's

16 still a competitive--that one of the other

23 FITCH: --there is a--it does make sense that they
24 would submit a lower price if it's appropriate.

25 BLOOM: I'll make a motion that we accept the totals

1 on the Liquid Bituminous Materials, the costs.

2 ROUSSEAU: Second.

3 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."

4 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

5 BLOOM: Aye.

6 IRVING: Aye. Motion carried. Do we have any other
7 business.

8 FITCH: That's all I have. Thank you very much.

9 IRVING: Okay.

10 ELSER: I have no other business before the board,
11 today.

12 IRVING: May I have--

13 ROUSSEAU: While Mr. Highway Director--Linda, would
14 you share with us--

15 IRVING: Wait a minute. She needs to leave.

16 BLOOM: Go on.

17 ROUSSEAU: Pardon me?

18 IRVING: She needs to leave.

19 BLOOM: What--what do you need?

20 ROUSSEAU: Well, I--just a very quick thing, you
21 might tell us about what's going on with the railroad
22 crossing?

2 FITCH: should go pretty quickly. They're going to
3 have, again, the traffic closings, and the traffic
4 control posted on their web site, plus we'll have a
5 message board out there. So, we're getting those
6 things back in order to start up construction again.
7 IRVING: And you've got the blinking light going at
8 Old Auburn and Union Chapel, I see--
9 FITCH: Yes--
10 IRVING: --that it's--
11 FITCH: --yes.
12 IRVING: --it's started.
13 FITCH: Yes, we--because of the improvements there,
14 we felt, to improve the safety of that intersection,
15 we needed a four way flasher there. That will remain
16 a four way stop until it's--until traffic increases
17 enough that a full signal is warranted.
18 IRVING: Tell me, on the corner of Till and
19 Coldwater, too, I know that there's been a discussion
20 about maybe some type of a light or something there.
21 Or, does that involve the State, and not--
22 FITCH: Till and Coldwater?
23 IRVING: Isn't it Till, where the--across from those
24 new businesses? I think--
25 FITCH: Yes--

1 IRVING: --Construction Control is there, and--
2 FITCH: --that was--warrants were done during the
3 design, and it indicated it was not warranted. Now,
4 that is in the city, so the city is going to have to
5 --is responsible, I guess, to do the warrants and
6 justify--
7 IRVING: Okay.
8 FITCH: --whether that is warranted for--but that,
9 actually there's--traffic has changed there at that
10 location. And there's more development proposed west
11 on Till Road. So, I would guess in a few years it
12 would be warranted.
13 IRVING: Commissioner Rousseau, would you like to--
14 let's talk about railroad crossings now.
15 ROUSSEAU: Well, I had a great interest in that, and
16 I talked to Linda about it, and she has some--I think
17 some good news about railroad crossings.
18 BLOOM: Because of all the concern, and because we
19 have had many accidents at railroad crossings,
20 especially because they're not properly marked, and
21 other counties around us have even asked for some
22 assistance, like stop signs or whatever. So we've
23 done this study, and the highway department is coming
24 up with--to begin with, 12 locations, and Norfolk
25 Southern has offered to pay for the materials and the

2 course, but at least their going to pay for the
3 initial cost of the installation, and--have we got
4 our 12 locations yet?
5 FITCH: I have not received a list of the numbers--
6 BLOOM: Okay.

8 BLOOM: Okay.
9 FITCH: We were going to look at the locations where
10 they were the darkest--
11 BLOOM: Right.
12 FITCH: --where there are trees and things that--
13 that, especially at night--INDOT has indicated they
14 will put up illumination lights, not flasher--
15 BLOOM: INDOT?
16 FITCH: --signals or gates.
17 BLOOM: I thought Norfolk Southern was going to be a
18 part of this cost.
19 FITCH: No. IN--no, INDOT--
20 BLOOM: INDOT's--
21 FITCH: --will pay for--
22 BLOOM: --going to do it, okay.
23 FITCH: --the materials and the lights. Once they're
24 installed--
25 ROUSSEAU: Reflective stuff or--

0048
1 BLOOM: Yeah.
2 ROUSSEAU: --ones that are lit?
3 FITCH: Illumination. They'll be on poles with,
4 overhead lights, similar to, you know, your street
5 light poles.
6 BLOOM: No, it works, yeah, it's a light.
7 FITCH: There will be one on each side of the
8 crossing.
9 ROUSSEAU: But do you have crossbucks up there?
10 FITCH: Yes.
11 ROUSSEAU: Are they going--and then will they be
12 blinking lights?
13 FITCH: No. No.
14 ROUSSEAU: Well, the thing that--
15 FITCH: These are just--
16 ROUSSEAU: --was interesting--
17 FITCH: --illumination, just for illumination.
18 ROUSSEAU: --according to what I've read, is that two
19 thirds of the accidents at railroad crossings happen
20 during the day with--with the arms that come down,
21 and blinking lights--
22 FITCH: Right.
23 ROUSSEAU: --and that two thirds of those accidents
24 happen in that situation. And, so, while we're doing
25 something here, people are still going to have figure

0049
1 out that they've got to be careful at railroad
2 crossings.
3 FITCH: Yes. This is a very complicated issue. I've
4 read a lot of studies on how to protect railroad
5 crossings, and the--like I say, signals and gates is
6 always--well, that's the safest, but statistics show
7 that, like you said, anywhere from two thirds to 50%
8 of all the accidents occur at signal and gated
9 crossings. So, if that's the highest form of
10 protection, there's still accidents, so--there's--
11 people just have to, I think, pay attention and be
12 aware that they have to slow down and look both ways.
13 ROUSSEAU: Well, anyhow, we're going to go on the
14 record that we're trying to do something, but it's

15 still going to be up to the driver to keep from
16 driving into the side of train that's parked across
17 the road, and if there are cross--if there are
18 crossbucks down, or arms down, and lights are
19 blinking, that means you are supposed to stop. And,
20 I read where there was a gentleman who was walking
21 across, in front of the train, and got hit. You
22 know, it's--we can do the best we can, but are we
23 going to really be resolving the problem, I don't
24 know, but we're going to be attempting to do so.
25 FITCH: We feel that illumination is a step, at least

0050
1 illuminate the crossing, because some of the
2 complaints is that they just can't see the trains.
3 And, the train companies are starting to put
4 illumination stickers on the side of the cars now,
5 they don't--like I say, it's still--it's just
6 something new, but they're starting to put things so
7 that you can see the train at night when it's moving.

8 BLOOM: From--from afar.
9 FITCH: Because in some areas, I mean, if a--you just
10 can't see the train at all. So the illumination will
11 certainly help in these locations and the State's
12 offered to pay for this material, and so the only
13 thing the County will have to do is pay for the
14 energy for the light. The next--the next step--
15 again, this is a statewide problem, as you know,
16 Indiana is the second or third in the country for
17 accidents at railroad crossings. And, this is a--
18 BLOOM: I'm not happy about that.

19 FITCH: --is a problem we're trying to tackle
20 statewide. I think Allen County was designated as
21 the second worst in the state, but they don't tell
22 you that we are the second largest city, urban area,
23 in this state also, so it makes sense that we would
24 have, you know, more--more accidents, because we have
25 more cars crossing railroad tracks. So, statistics

0051
1 sometimes fool you--
2 ROUSSEAU: Well, the--
3 FITCH: --but we are going to tackle--
4 ROUSSEAU: --the one lady--
5 IRVING: You can make--
6 FITCH: --this problem.
7 IRVING: --them read any way you want.
8 ROUSSEAU: --the one lady said, "Well, it was foggy,"
9 and stuff, and--and, you know, and drove into the
10 side of a train. I think it was even stopped.
11 IRVING: Uh-huh (affirmative).

12 BLOOM: Yeah.
13 ROUSSEAU: A light--an overhead light, in all
14 likelihood, it's going to--if you've driven at night,
15 in the fog, that's nice, but you don't have any idea
16 whether it's somebody's driveway, or whether it's
17 another road, or whatever it is, so, I--you know,
18 we're still going to have--somebody's going to have
19 smarten up with what they're doing about crossing
20 railroads.
21 FITCH: Yes, statistically they've shown like 98
22 [98%] or 99% of the accidents are caused by driver
23 error, so--

24 IRVING: Well, thank you very much, Mike.

25 FITCH: Thank you very much. And--

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1 IRVING: We appreciate it. Keep us up to date.

2 FITCH: Yes, it's a problem we're going to continue
3 to work on because it's--

4 BLOOM: It is a problem--

5 FITCH: --there may be some new--

6 BLOOM: --a major problem.

7 FITCH: --there may be some new things out there, and
8 it's not an inexpensive thing to solve either.

9 IRVING: No, it's not.

10 FITCH: Thank you very much.

11 IRVING: May I have a motion to waive the 2nd reading
12 on--

13 ROUSSEAU: So moved.

14 BLOOM: Second.

15 IRVING: All in favor say, "aye."

16 ROUSSEAU: Aye.

17 BLOOM: Aye.

18 IRVING: Aye. Do we have any comments from the
19 public? (No response.) Thank you very much and have
20 a nice week.
